## President's Annual Report

I began last year's Report with this statement – "COVID-19 has continued to impact the Redland Genealogical Society in a number of ways". This applies equally as well this year, although, following a year of stuttering "starts and stops", things in society have moved to what could be termed the "new normal". For the past few months we've been able to operate our Genie Room within the Cleveland Library without enforced closures and with minimal sanitising of equipment being required – a far cry from just a few months ago! There is no doubt that COVID-19 has had an immense effect on the attendance in our "Room" and that the Society will need to introduce strategies to try to improve attendance numbers during the coming year.

Our Genie Room is central to our society. We are indeed fortunate to have sole access to the room provided by the Redland City Council through the Redland Library Services. This facility is greatly appreciated. I would like to thank Monique Whitewood, Acting Service Manager, Redland City Council Libraries, for her support during her time of tenure while replacing Branch Librarian, Kim English. I recently signed a Deed of Variation to our Memorandum of Understanding with the Redland City Council. This Deed extends our Memorandum of Understanding until 30 June 2023, at which time it is hoped a longer-term Memorandum of Understanding will be instigated.

With the Genie Room being so significant to the Society's being, it is understandable that our Genealogical Research Assistants (GRAs) are pivotal to what we offer both our members and members of the general public. What GRAs do is so important to the operation of the Society, and I would like to express my gratitude to each and every one of you for the time you devote to this activity. Thank you, one and all!! Jeanne Dixon is one GRA I'll "single out" for a special mention – when our new Librarian, Pat Maclean, was forced to resign due to ill health in February this year, Jeanne stepped up and took on the role of Acting Librarian and has fulfilled this role with aplomb. Thanks indeed Jeanne!! Jeanne has been supported in the role by Greta Brown who has produced the very necessary GRA rosters. Thanks, Greta!

Our Guest Speaker Program was off to a rocky start in August 2021 when we were forced to have Helen Smith speak to us via Zoom because of a sudden introduction of COVID-19 restrictions. Since that time we've been able to have all of our Guest Speakers present to us at our actual face to face meetings. A variety of presentations have been enjoyed – Cara Downes provided information about Copyright for Family Historians in October 2021. Dr Karen Thurecht gave a dynamic presentation built around her book "Murder at the Dunwich Asylum" in February 2022 and in March Judy Lofthouse focussed on "Find My Past" and, in particular, the 1921 Census released in January 2022. Col Sutcliffe's presentation on "The Bollon Diaries" was very well received in April 2022, while the presentation on the Wacol Immigration Centre provided by Paul Budde in May 2022 had particular significance for our Treasurer, Yvonne Weston, given she spent some of her childhood at the Centre. In June 2022 our Guest Speaker was Peter Ludlow who spoke about a visit to Minjerribah. During the year, in place of a Guest Speaker, we trialed two member-driven events - a Brick Wall discussion in September 2021 and an opportunity to discuss "My Favourite Sites" in November 2021. These were well received by those present.

I would like to thank each and every member of the Management Committee for their contributions to the Redland Genealogical Society during the past year. Kevin Hughes has once again provided a mountain of support in his roles as Vice President and Webmaster. As always, Dianne Smith who's presently fled to Canada, has done an absolutely sterling job as Secretary – Dianne's efficiency is amazing. Treasurer, Yvonne Weston, has fitted into the role very well and, as with Dianne, does her job very efficiently – I truly appreciate the way Yvonne has taken on the role of Secretary in Dianne's absence. Thank you, Yvonne! Karen Hawkes moved from the role of Assistant Treasurer during the year and has agreed to take on the job of Librarian, beginning after today's meeting. Thank you, Karen, for taking on this vital position! Val Burt took on Karen's role as Assistant Treasurer and she and Yvonne plan to work very closely together. Thanks, Val! Our wonderful Annette Hall has continued on as our Membership Officer – Annette knows all members by name and is very excited that our membership numbers are beginning to rise again. Thanks, Annette, for all you do in so many areas of our Society's operation! Newsletter Editor, Greg Glidden, has unusually been forced to request members provide information for the "Redland Researcher" during the year with great result. Thanks Greg, for your fabulous work with our quarterly Newsletter and for all the additional things you've tackled, including setting up reciprocal visiting rights with societies throughout Australia. While COVID-19 seriously dented our ability to conduct displays, Elaine Speck has organised some very successful ones during 2022. Thanks, Elaine – your enthusiasm for your role is

appreciated by all. Our records have continued to be safely maintained by Archivist, Janelle Everest. Thanks, Janelle, for performing this important role. When Pat Misson passed away in July 2021 our society lost an absolutely superb researcher. In recent months we've been fortunate enough to have Ian Barrett take on the role of Research Officer. Ian has already completed one project on behalf of the Society. Thank you Ian. Lyn Smyth has again filled the role of greeter at our monthly meetings, although there have been times during the year when, due to ill health, Lyn has been unable to fulfil this vital role. This is when the spirit of our society shines brightly – somebody else always steps in very quickly to greet members and visitors as they enter our meetings. Finally, a thank you to our Patron, Les McFadzen, for his continuing support of our Society.

Thanks too to the co-ordinators of our Interest Groups. Under Convenor, Annette Hall's leadership the Magazine Interest Group has thrived. We all look forward to Annette's report each month in which she always has an interesting piece of information she's discovered in a magazine to share with us. The Writing Group has continued to meet every two months with some of the Group's work being included in the Society's Newsletter. Two new Interest Groups were added during the year. Penny Stewart convenes a Zoom Group which aims to provide a forum for discussion and learning about family history, including knowledge about the Family Tree Maker program. Thank you Penny for your initiative in starting this group. Additionally, a DNA Group began operating in October 2021 and has continued to meet on a monthly basis. An exciting development during the year was the introduction of a Members' Only section on our website – it is here that members are able to peruse magazines and journals from societies throughout the world. A big thank you to Kevin Hughes and Greg Glidden who collaborated to achieve lift-off in January and to Kevin for his continued monitoring of this section of our website.

In May 2022 we hosted ten members from the Caloundra Family History Research Incorporated. The visit included a Meet and Greet at the Cleveland Library, a presentation from local History Librarian, Angela Puata, a walk through our Genie Room and then a car tour around the many historic sites in the Cleveland and Ormiston areas and included lunch at the historic Grandview Hotel. Our guests thoroughly enjoyed the day and have invited members of our society to visit them later in 2022.

In closing, I'll reiterate something from my 2020 Annual Report – the main challenge facing our Society at this point in time is the maintenance of membership numbers. While our membership has increased marginally of late, we must continue to employ strategies to encourage membership of our society, if we want this trend to continue. What Treasurer, Yvonne Weston, does with Facebook is a great start. Thank you, Yvonne. There are many other things that we as a society need to instigate, if we are to grow – one of our biggest problems is ensuring that residents of the Redland City area are aware of our existence. 

## Librarian's Annual Report

The year started with the great loss to us all when Pat Misson passed away on 23<sup>rd</sup> July. Pat did so much for the Society especially the Library. She is greatly missed.

This has been a mixed year for the Library. The number of people visiting our room is well down, we only welcomed 628 members and visitors this year compared to 928 in the previous year. This is partly due to visiting restrictions at the beginning of the year due to Covid and people still feeling unsure about crowded places. Book loans were also very disappointing with only 37 books being borrowed throughout the year. Our collection of material covers a wide range of topics, so please look at our catalogue to see what you can find about the way our ancestors lived and look at our many books on "How to trace" ancestors by their various professions and much more.

At the beginning of the year we welcomed a new Librarian, Pat Maclean. She was doing so well, being full of enthusiasm and ideas, when in February she had to resign suddenly due to ill-health. There being no one else available at the time, I undertook to hold the fort until the AGM. Thank you for all you did Pat, we all hope you are much better now.

We have renewed our subscriptions to The Genealogist and RootsIreland as well as we still have our own subscription to FindMyPast. This supplements the Redland City Library "One seat" subscription. Of course Ancestry is free to us all. I must add a thank you to the Redland City Library for allowing it to be free to everyone at home until last December, seeing us through the worst of Covid.

Our cataloguing problems are now at an end. The Redland City Library undertook the massive task of changing their cataloguing system which took longer than expected. As a result none of our new additions to the library for most of the year, have been able to reach the shelves until this week. Details of what is now available will be presented in the new Librarian's report.

The Redland City Library have, as always been a great support, with special thanks to Angela Puata, who has just begun a well-earned retirement and also Gillian McNeill, who has been so helpful with my many queries.

To all our GRAs, a very special thank you for all your hard work throughout the year. It hasn't been easy with many of you doing extra duties to keep things going. I must make a special mention of all the extra help Annette Hall has given, doing up to 4/5 duties a month at times and of being of great assistance to me. We really do need more help, so anyone who feels they would like to join this group to assist people in finding their family, they would be most welcome.

At this very first meeting most of the time was spent in discussing what the various testing organisations offered clients. In November we met again in the Birkdale School of Arts Hall, this time on the upper level – we'd hoped to share DNA results, but quickly discovered there was no Wi Fi available, so the group discussed DNA results in a general way.

In 2022 we were fortunate enough to be able to secure bookings in the Elders Room in the Cleveland Library. Here Wi Fi is readily available, and we've been able to avail ourselves of the use of the inbuilt Data Projector. We viewed some "How to Get Started" videos at the March and April meetings and organised for Sharon Upton to talk to us about the Leeds Method at our May meeting. Member, Kevin Hughes, spoke at our June meeting about an amazing discovery in his family, following contact from an unknown cousin.

## Newsletter Editor's Annual Report

The *Redland Researcher* continues to be published each February, May, August, and November. Its success can be attributed to the ongoing support from our members and the pool of talent that exists among them.

Adequate stocks, consisting of a variety of articles in varying lengths, is a necessity for preparing each quarter's newsletter. On the rare occasion that my stocks have become low, an SOS to members always resulted in this promptly being set right.

During the latter part of 2021, efforts were made to increase the number of family history societies with which we exchange magazines. Agreements were reached with an additional ten (10) organisations.

There now is a total of twenty-one (21) magazines freely available for members to read. They are from societies located in Queensland, New South Wales, the ACT Tasmania, the Northern Territory, and the UK. The South Australian Genealogy & Heraldry Society advised that its policy presently does not permit this, but this matter will be reconsidered at their Annual General Meeting held in October.

Since the creation of the Members' Section in our website, these magazines are accessible to our members from their home computers. Fifteen (15) are uploaded to the website and hyperlinks give direct access to another six (6).

Members also can directly access the regular newsletters from History Queensland, Genealogical Society of Qld, Qld Family History Society and RootsIreland, through hyperlinks in the Members' Section.

There is a lot of helpful information to be gleaned from reading these magazines and newsletters. I encourage members to do so.

Thank you one and all for your support. You make my task so much easier for publishing each edition.

## Writing Interest Group Convenor's Annual Report

This year we were able to have all of our meetings face to face in the Elders Room in the Library, so COVID had little effect on the Writing Group's operation. While the number attending has not been high, usually around 6 – 8 people present, we've been able to have some interesting discussions and offer suggestions for those with writing queries.

Our meetings always start with the opportunity to write. It amazes me the diversity of ways people respond to the same writing task. This in itself engenders quite a lot of interest. Some of the writing tasks during this year included writing about "My First Job", Trains and Railways in your family history, and how floods and flooding have impacted your family. Members have submitted some very interesting samples of their writing for others to read and critique. We learn so much from these sessions.

In July and September we tackled the somewhat tricky issue of inserting photographs with captions into text, learning how to ensure the caption remained with the photo, no matter what additions or deletions were made to the text around it. In November we perused a new addition to our Genie Room Library, titled "Finding True Connections. How to Learn and Write About a Family Member's History". ## Guest Speakers

### May 2022

Our Guest Speaker was Paul Budde, his topic, *Old Brisbane Albums: Wacol Immigration Centre*. He gave an informative address on this locality's historical significance and the efforts of the Dutch community to revive some of this.

During WWII, it was named Camp Columbia when it was established as an army base to house Australian and US forces. Camp Columbia covered a very large area, much of which was later developed into Brisbane's western suburbs and industrial/commercial areas. In the latter part of the war years, it also accommodated Dutch military units, and the Netherlands East Indies Government-in-Exile, the only foreign government ever to be established on Australian soil.

Following the war, some of Camp Columbia's existing barracks were used to house persons displaced by the war. By 1950, these had become the "Wacol Migrant Centre", used for re-settling families migrating to Australia from Europe and the UK. There is more to read on this part of its history in Yvonne's story on page 12.

### June 2022

This month's Guest Speaker was Peter Ludlow, a local historian and author, his topic "A Visit to Minjerribah (North Stradbroke Island)". Peter gave an informative presentation on the folklore of the local Aboriginal Tribes of the Quandamooka people, and the colonisation and settlement of the island.

The beginning of permanent contact between Aboriginal and European people took place in 1825 when Moreton Bay convict settlement commander, Patrick Logan, set up a garrison on the island. Conflicts arose from time to time, due to European encroachments onto tribal land, particularly that of a sacred significance. Serious armed conflict flared up during 1831-32 with deaths on both sides.

A quarantine station was established at Dunwich in 1850 to monitor infectious diseases among passengers from Britain. A benevolent asylum added in 1864, and a lazaret built in 1892. The Dunwich Benevolent Asylum operated until 1946, during which year patients were transferred to the Eventide Home on the mainland at Brighton, near Sandgate.

## A Change in Perception

It is amazing how your attitude can change over time.

From grade 4 onwards, particularly in high school, I was ashamed of my early years. Why? I was from an immigrant family and born whilst living in Wacol Immigration Camp. The ground was gravel, mostly, and we shared a hut with a Danish family, much like the one in the photo, except they had their door on the far left. Two rooms for us, a kitchen, and a bedroom. Everything else was provided in shared amenities, down the back of the camp. The Danish family had a mirror image layout in their "home".



Knowing that the first several places that we lived were not the best, including one rat-infested farmhouse and a stone cottage with a rammed earth floor, was not an ideal start to life; certainly it did not make me feel like I belonged to or fitted in with other Australians. Dad had his struggles too, being a qualified accountant but not having his qualifications recognised because they were Dutch, not English or American. So, his first job in Australia was working as a day labourer on the nearby prison farm. So over time, I would not discuss my upbringing with my classmates, friends, or co-workers.

That is until recently! Little did I know that the camp that I spent my first 20-22 months of life in was an important part of Brisbane's forgotten history. By a chance post on Facebook, I came to realise that the camp was a former military base, Camp Columbia, with significant history and importance, despite its current name.

After some conversations, virtually, with one of the major project researchers who is piecing together the history of the camp, I was invited to attend the official project presentation to the Ambassador to the Kingdom of The Netherlands, H.E. Mrs Marion Derckx. Not only was I representing myself, but I was also going on behalf of the Redland Genealogical Society. What a privilege!

Since then, having mentioned this event to those of my friends who use Facebook, I have learnt that a few of my former school, work and travel friends all lived there as well. Like me, they also did not talk about that time for various reasons. Some of them are now contributing to the project. Our experiences are different but at least they will be preserved for the future by being recorded in the project.

Whilst this information is often available elsewhere what they include is a wealth of additional pointers that can confirm your findings or, alternatively, give you that additional piece of the puzzle to explore further.

It also has a range of both downloadable historical books and links as well as snippets pertaining to the various families located in those parishes.

## Crime Prevention Corner

### Vehicle Security Tips for Families

- The majority of crimes reported in Bayside suburbs every week involve motor vehicles. Vehicles are either stolen or have valuables stolen from inside. Vehicles parked in public places including streets and carparks at night are particularly vulnerable.
- Most of these crimes are committed by juveniles or young adult males.
- A significant factor why these crimes occur are that as many as one in seven vehicles (approximately 15 %) are left unlocked and / or unsecure ie: valuables left in plain view inside the vehicle.

**Owners can minimise the risk of becoming victims of crime by taking some simple precautions.**

- Lock it or Lose it! Make sure your vehicle is secured and remove belongings when you leave it unattended, right down to loose coins. GPS units, dash cameras, mobile phones, tablets etc are extremely popular with thieves and easy to dispose of.
- Keep your car key out of sight inside your home – not on the kitchen bench. Often, car keys are stolen during house break-ins, allowing the offender to gain access to the vehicle at a later time / date.
- Keep your garage door closed and secure at all times, even when you are at home.
- Lock your car when it is garaged and do not leave the key somewhere nearby.
