RGS members can use the RGS Library and its facilities, including accessing available online research organisations, at any time the Cleveland Library is open. To obtain the Genie Room key, members must present their RGS Redland City Council's Libraries Service card to the Cleveland Library Reception staff. It is not the same card that you use for borrowing privately from the Council's Libraries. It is the card given to all joining members. You must activate this card at Cleveland Library each time you renew RGS membership by presenting it with your latest RGS Membership Card.

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President's Annual Report – 2024

It is with pleasure that I present my Report for the 2023-2024 Year. The Redland Genealogical Society appears to be thriving with an increased membership and lots of interest being shown in Family History in our community. As I've always stated, our Genie Room is central to our wellbeing. It is here that we assist members and members of the general public to search for their ancestors. We are very fortunate to have the support of the Redland City Council which provides the room within the Cleveland Library as well as access to Ancestry and Find My Past with the 1921 Census addition. Our current Funding Agreement with the Council expires on 30 June 2027. I would like to acknowledge our gratitude to Local History Librarian, Georgia Bennett, for her continued support of our Society. In August 2023 Georgia, Penny Stewart, Karen Hawkes and I collaborated to provide an information session for family historians as part of National Family History Month.

While our Genie Room is central to our wellbeing it would mean nothing without the support of our Genealogical Research Assistants (GRAs) who provide information and support for all who visit our Room. I would like to thank each and every one of our GRAs for what you have done throughout the past year – you are the core of our Society and what a great core you are!!! I need to single out our hardworking Librarian, Karen Hawkes who leads the team of GRAs. Karen has done an absolutely exceptional job with organising the Library and conducting meetings of GRAs. She was elected unopposed at a recent meeting of GRAs to lead the team again in 2024 – 2025. Thank you, Karen!

With our Guest Speaker program we've attempted to increase members' knowledge of family history associated matters. In August 2023, Helen Connor from the Genealogical Society of Queensland provided us with a beautifully illustrated presentation on Irish immigration, while Peita-Maree Clark from the National Archives, Queensland Branch, showed us how to search for World War II Service Records in October. November saw Charlotte Sale give us a wonderful presentation on Family Search – she certainly broadened our views on the information available from this free site. Information on the very interesting Wiki Tree was provided by Pat McCallum in February 2024, while in April, Val Blomer gave some very interesting data about Dance and its role in the Colonial and Convict era in Australia. Members were astounded to hear about the action with Flying Boats in the Redlands area when Terence Hendricks from the Redland Museum addressed us in May. In June we tried something very different – we organised an address from Jamie Roberts, representing the Commonwealth War Graves Commission, via Zoom. While we were concerned with being able to connect with Jamie who was in the United States, the presentation went seamlessly with the skills of Vice President, Kevin Hughes, and then Secretary, Penny Stewart. These presentations were augmented by a Brick Wall discussion in August 2023 and a discussion on Family Traits in March 2024.

I would like to thank each and every one of the members of the Management Committee – this group has been an absolute pleasure to work with! Vice President, Kevin Hughes, has continued to manage both the website and the growing DNA Interest Group as well as setting up sound and vision for our meetings at the Donald Simpson Centre and assisting with setting up Displays in the community. Thank you, Kevin! What you do is truly appreciated.

Penny Stewart stepped up as Secretary at the 2023 Annual General Meeting and has done a sterling job in this role. Unfortunately, Penny needed to step aside as Secretary after the June 2024 meeting due to the fact that she is moving away from the Redland area. Thanks, Penny, for all that you did for the Society!

Treasurer, Yvonne Weston, has continued to provide a wonderful service as Treasurer, backed up by Val Burt as Assistant Treasurer. Yvonne and Val have managed to conduct financial matters for our Society in a seamless manner when one or both of them are absent on holidays. Yvonne has continued to manage our growing Facebook presence as well. Thanks Yvonne and Val!!

After a period of 18 years at the helm of Membership for our Society Annette Hall has decided to "hang up her boots". What an amazing contribution to our Society over all of those years!! Thank you, Annette – I've really appreciated your accurate and timely advice. Greg Glidden has continued to produce the quarterly *Redland Researcher* during the year, despite growing health issues. Pat McCallum has recently advised Greg of his intention to take on the role of Newsletter Editor going forward. I thank Pat for this timely offer and Greg for the ten years of dedication to the *Redland Researcher*. Your enthusiasm and the accurate editions of the *Redland Researcher* have been appreciated by all members. I wish you all the very best for a healthy future, Greg!

Elaine Speck has continued to organise Displays for the Society during the year – these included a display at Alexandra Hills Shopping Centre in October 2023 and another at the Museum in March 2024. Such displays are important for our Society as a means of getting the work the Society does known out in the community. It always amazes me how many

do not know of our existence, despite the fact that we've been operating for more than 40 years. Our records have continued to be safely maintained by Archivist, Janelle Everest. Thank, Janelle – it's comforting to know that the Society's history is safe. Thanks, too to Dianne Smith and Lyn Smyth for their work as Additional Management Committee members – Dianne provided stellar support in organising last year's Christmas Lunch and has acted as Secretary in the month since Penny's departure. Lyn does the important job of Welcome Officer for all of our meetings at the Donald Simpson Centre. Thanks, Dianne and Lyn.

Our Interest Groups are an important part of whom we are. Annette Hall has continued to manage the Magazine Interest Group, providing us with some very interesting excerpts from various magazines at our meetings. The Writing Group has met every two months according to the established schedule. Some members' work has been published in the *Redland Researcher*. The Group enjoyed 2 Guest Speakers during the year – one, Ann Pollitt, brought along family history books she'd published over the years. Group members were astounded at the quality and informative nature of Ann's books. The other Guest Speaker was Christine Leonard who showed a different way of organising family history information for publication. The DNA Group has continued to grow in its collective knowledge under Kevin Hughes's leadership while the Zoom Group has thrived under the guidance of Penny Stewart – this group will need to be disbanded following Penny's move away from the Redlands, unless there is somebody willing to "take on the reins".

I would like to report on 2 significant changes during 2024. The Society has used the banking services of the Heritage Bank for many years. Because the Heritage Bank was unable to provide us with the means to make payments by Card, a change was made to the Bank of Queensland. I would like to express appreciation to Yvonne Weston for the seamless way in which the change took place. Already, we've been able to make a Card payment to pay for a subscription, something we could not do with Heritage Bank – not only was the process much simpler, it also saved the Society a sizeable sum in Bank Transfer fees!! The other change is the work done by the Management Committee on the various Forms the Society has created over the years. The Management Committee has adopted a format to be used for all Forms, going forward. The process was led by Greg Glidden whose attention to detail has been admirable. This project has set the Society up for many years to come.

Due to the reports provided by Membership Officer, Annette Hall, members should be aware that our membership has increased during the year. At one stage we had 122 members, but this has now decreased marginally. I thank all members who have been promoting the work our society does- the increase in membership is a reflection of what you are doing. Thank you!! As reported in 2023 one of the initiatives from our latest Funding Agreement with the Redland City Council is to aim to increase our membership by 10% by June 2027. I urge members to continue promoting our society out in the community.

Before concluding my report, I would like to acknowledge our Patron, Les McFadzen. Les took on the role of Patron following his many years as President of our Society and has continued to support the Society whenever and however he can. Thank you, Les, for your continued advice and support.

Thank you one and all for your support of the Redland Genealogical Society. It's truly appreciated. Without your enthusiasm the Redland Genealogical Society would not be the successful organisation it is. In closing, I wish those members newly elected to the Management Committee a successful year and to all members a happy and healthy year ahead.

We have welcomed 884 members and visitors to our Genie Room, with many visitors joining on the spot after talking to our GRAs. Members have borrowed a total of 105 Books, CDs, Magazines and Journals. A list of our complete Catalogue can be viewed on our Society Website, the Redland Library Website and on Computer No: 3 in the Genie Room.

The Society has continued to renew our online subscriptions to: The Biographical Database of Australia, The Genealogist, FindMyPast and Roots Ireland.

Also, our magazine subscriptions to: Family Tree Magazine UK, Who Do You Think You Are? and Irish Roots.

We've continued meeting in the Elders Room in the Cleveland Library. While the number of people attending has been quite low, some very in depth discussion has occurred and wonderful writing produced.

Our meetings always start with the opportunity to write. It amazes me the diversity of ways people respond to the same writing task. Tasks have included A Place I'd Like to Visit, Which Ancestor I Would Invite to Christmas Lunch, How Weather Influenced My Ancestor's Life and Family Traits. Members have submitted some very interesting samples of their writing for others to read and critique. We learn so much from these sessions.

In July 2023 we discussed the strategies for writing for a different voice, something that is difficult to accomplish, although at least two of our members have mastered the technique. In September the group enjoyed a presentation from the first of 2 Guest Speakers for the year when Anne Pollitt arrived laden down with the wonderful books she's produced over the years. When You Write Something to be included in the Redland Researcher

Found in South Brisbane 1859

Pat McCallum



Queensland separated from the Colony of New South Wales in 1859. In August 1909, the *Queenslander* published "A Jubilee Retrospect. – The City of South Brisbane" by W. Clark. How exciting to find a reference there to my Great Great Grandfather, Daniel McCallum. Daniel was a house carpenter in Glasgow, convicted and sentenced to transportation for life for stealing two silk handkerchiefs. He arrived on the ship *John* on 13 September 1829. He was married in 1840 and was engaged building churches around Maitland. He made his way to

the Moreton Bay settlement.

Remembering times from fifty plus years earlier, in 1909 Clark writes about the old-time village established at South Brisbane on indigenous lands called Mehanchin (Meanjin). At this time Europeans were still outnumbered by traditional owners camping on the ridge above. At the time he remembers it as a favourite camping place for the emancipationists of the penal regime.

In 1849, there were only 44 buildings, grouped around what is now Russell-street where the ferry crossed to North Brisbane. These buildings were situated along the river bank for about three blocks, and only extending back two streets, to Stanley and Grey-streets. A street map from the time shows more streets were surveyed. However, in 1859 it was still unformed as suggested by Thomas Baines painting looking across to South Brisbane from the north bank. The painting was done from sketches

made in 1855. In 1859, when the estate of Mr. Bunton had his property on Lot 10 Melbourne St. up for sale, it was described as a large five roomed weatherboard cottage, substantially built with hardwood floors. A building which would have operated as his Inn with the McCallums staying nearby. This location was long ago built over with the railway line connecting South Brisbane to Roma Street.

David Bunton along with Jacob Goode of Burnett Inn (Nanango) fame, both publicans, were amongst the 20 qualified voters from South Brisbane on the 1847 electoral list. On one infamous occasion in 1848, Goode and his colleagues

Grev-street was the only other street showing any settlement upon it in the David Bunton's Wheat Sheal vear 1×49. Inn stood quite isolated at one end of it. at the edge of a large swamp. Near to it lived Dan M'Cullum, a corpenter Francis Glynn Connolly, father South Brisbane's medico, of that name. On the opposite ade of Grey-street John Bryden-Petrie's foreman carpenter-owned a cot Next to but leased to Mesors. Albert, John, and Henry Hockings, merchants.

The Queenslander, Sat 7 Aug 1909. Page 21. A JUBILEE RETROSPECT.—THE CITY OF SOUTH BRISBANE. infamous occasion in 1848, Goode and his colleagues were returning from a three-day racing event with their horses on a punt which took them across the river to South Brisbane. A dispute arose between the passengers and the skipper of the punt on whether he should set out with them immediately or wait for further passengers. Goode and his colleagues forced the punt to set off. The skipper stopped it and a fight ensued with the skipper going overboard and in danger of drowning. He was saved from being drawn under the punt by a more fair-minded passenger and Goode was fined £5.

Jacob Goode commenced at the Burnett Inn, the founding of Nanango, in 1849. Daniel is thought to have built the shingle roof on the original Burnett Inn.

Using Ancestry Pro Tools with DNA Matches

Ancestry has introduced a new 'up size me' option called Pro-Tools. You can read a support article on this new feature at <u>https://support.ancestry.com/s/article/Ancestry-Pro-Tools-Membership?language=en_US</u>.

The enhanced shared matches feature of Ancestry Pro Tools is similar to a built-in feature in MyHeritage DNA matches lists. It shows you how strongly a DNA match is connected to other matches on the shared match list associated with that DNA match. Those who use both platforms will recognise this because MyHeritage presents that information in two columns and Ancestry without Pro Tools only has one. The first column in MyHeritage shows how strongly the match is between you and the shared match. This is what the Ancestry shared matches feature does without the enhancement. The second column in MyHeritage shows how strongly each shared match in the list is to the DNA match you are investigating. You can now get this information in Ancestry by the extra Pro Tools subscription.

It has been frustrating that up until the release of Pro Tools Ancestry has held back that information. With Pro Tools you will now get the second column of information to help you with identifying how that match fits into your extended family tree not just how they are related to you. There are still features of the shared match list included in the MyHeritage basic subscription which are not available in Ancestry. These include being able to link to chromosome mapping to see where the shared DNA segments occur and being able to sort the list of shared matches by the strength of the match to the DNA match being investigated (the second column) rather than to yourself (the first column).

Ancestry DNA Shared Matches with Pro Tools

This enhanced shared matches feature is clearly quite useful. Where you have a well-developed family tree and you know exactly where a good number of your shared matches fit into that tree, seeing how closely a DNA match is connected to each of those shared matches can point you to where that person most likely fits into your family tree. This can narrow down your genealogical investigations. For instance, if it is likely that the person is a third cousin and you share 2nd great grandparents, then the strength of the match to known relations might point you to which great grand uncle or aunt that person is descended from.

This will be productive in family history research. You may be lucky that the likely branch has limited possibilities. This adds more power to your DNA match-based family history research as there are many relatives tested in Ancestry who are not in MyHeritage. The kicker is that it is another subscription to pay.

What you can do

- Place passwords on all of your important documents.
- When creating a password, avoid using obvious passwords such as telephone numbers, birthdates or your mother's maiden name.
- Avoid using the same password on multiple accounts.
- Change your password regularly.
- Don't allow your computer to store your password.
- Secure all your personal information at home in a lockable filing cabinet or safe.
- Never carry your PIN number in your wallet with your ATM card.
- Avoid carrying documents such as your passport or birth certificate unless absolutely necessary. Try taking photos on your phone instead.
- Before discarding old bills, records or expired cards, ensure any identifying information is destroyed. Consider investing in a paper shredder for your home.
- Avoid providing personal information by phone, mail or online and ensure you know who you are dealing with before giving out personal information.
- Make sure your letterbox is secure and lockable and only post mail at official Australia Post boxes.
- Carefully check all transactions on your banking and credit card accounts each month to monitor for potential fraudulent transactions.
- Follow up if bills don't arrive on time or you don't receive an invoice.
- If you lose your wallet or purse, notify your bank immediately to protect your accounts.

 Identity theft and fraud have become some of the fastest growing crimes in the world. Identity theft and fraud can happen quickly and easily and most often you will not know you have fallen victim until after the fact.
